The Keeseekoose First Nation #367 Traditional Territory encompasses and lies within the Enbridge Line 3 Replacement Project area. Keeseekoose First Nation also holds title to other non-reserve fee simple lands in very close proximity to the corridor. These fee simple lands have an ability to change to reserve status once our process is complete. With such land interests and Treaty rights existing within our expanse of Traditional Territory the Keeseekoose First Nation feels strongly about projects such as these which could have potential major impacts on the lands in and surrounding the corridor. If there should ever be a major spill or malfunction during the life of the project this would definetly lead to serious impacts which go well beyond the pipeline right of way, considering the high volumes of product to be transported daily through this line. Keeseekoose has concerns related directly to any spills or malfunctions that may seriously impact areas surrounding the pipeline right of way where there are areas where Aboriginal and Treaty rights are exercised. Keeseekoose First Nation has serious concerns related to the socio economic effects of the project. Keeseekoose is a Treaty First Nation who's rights related to our Traditional Territory have been consistently impacted by governments over time. Keeseekoose maintains the position that any industry projects that take place within our Treaty and Traditional Territory serve to offer and provide our Nation with direct benefits. Industry does attempt to provide opportunities to Aboriginal stakeholders however there is nothing in the process that ensures equality to affected interest holders. Canada relies on the NEB and its Hearing process, to the extent possible, to fulfill their Duty to Consult. With this in mind the NEB must take steps to include and ensure that affected Aboriginal communities receive equal and meaningful direct benefits from major projects where NEB approvals are considered. As the NEB Hearing process has considerable importance placed on it by the Crown with respect to the Duty to Consult, it is imperative that Our interests be represented as an Intervener in this process. Keeseekoose First Nation has traditional and historical knowledge which relates directly to our Traditional Territory. The NEB's access and inclusion of this knowledge is vital to the NEB Hearing process.
