Bruce, I am writing to you with regard to my participation in the Trans Canada Pipelines' "Traditional Land Use Report" prepared by FMA Heritage Resources Consultants Inc. (FMA).

I recently reviewed a copy of the report and have some comments about the nature of my participation in that preparation of that report. First of all, I wish to clarify that I was hired as a private contractor with FMA. As you are aware, I was personally approached by FMA and asked to submit a proposal. I did so under my company name, Dene Land Services. In that proposal I outlined that I would undertake interview coordination, assist in conducting interviews and assist in preparing interview summaries for the report. I understand that Dene Tha' First Nation was supportive of me in undertaking this work as a private contractor.

My proposal was selected and I assisted FMA in late November 2004. It is important for you to understand the role I played as an independent contractor. I say so as I was somewhat concerned with the way the front cover of "Traditional Land Use Report." The cover states that I represented Dene Tha' First Nation. This is an inaccurate and this needs be changed to reflect the true role and nature of my participation. At no time did I purport to represent Dene Tha First Nation (DTFN) or the interests of DTFN. Therefore the report cover should read, "Valerie Bonnes: Dene Land Services".

Secondly, I understood and note that report is entitled "Phase I". Both DTFN and myself have been told by TCPL and FMA that they recognized that this report did not constitute a full or in depth study of the traditional use / traditional knowledge held by Dene Tha' members in relation to the project area. The study did in fact only deal with those members who hold trapline permits (whose traplines are intersected by the pipeline). Clearly much more work will be required given the large number of band members who utilize the area for a large variety of traditional, cultural and economic purposes. I understand that DTFN and TCPL are now working to address this major deficiency through the Community Review Process for the pipeline project. Further I understand that DTFN is

Re: DTFN / TCPL Community Review Workplan and Budget for Southern Portion of Mackenzie Gas Project (" Dickens and Vardie Projects")

Bruce, I have attached a redrafted workplan and budget for the Dene Tha' First Nations Community Review Process for the Dickens and Vardie projects. The workplan and budget are based on the original proposal that Dene Tha' First Nation (DTFN) tabled with Trans Canada Pipeline Corporation (TCPL) in December 2004. It is unfortunate that Dene Tha' did not receive a timely and positive response at that time and hence the delay to both parties in proceeding with the Community Review Process. This version attempts to reflect the discussions that occurred between DTFN and TCPL representatives and the issues that arose in relation to the proposal through December 2004 to March 2005. The reworked document represents a considerable compromise on the part of DTFN, who desires to engage TCPL in a constructive and timely information gathering process.

I GOT I DOO'S OTT I GOO

Notwithstanding the changes in this draft, the intent of the Community Review Process remains the sole, which is "to enable the community to understand and evaluate the issues and impacts arising from the proposed Dickens and Vardie projects (and to) assist the parties in identifying and resolving issues and concerns / issues on a bi – lateral basis, and to avoid resorting to Regulators where possible." In short, this initiative will assist DTFN and TCPL to identify potential impacts of the project on community members and become informed about their concerns.

By way of background, once DTFN was made aware of TCPL's support (through Kim McCaig) in principle to this initiative and associated funding in January 2005, it began the necessary logistical and planning work. A key part of this work has involved the retaining and orientating of three Community Co-ordinators who are now undertaking the required work. The Co-ordinators will prepare community members to participate in community meetings with TCPL in an informed manner, provide information to community members so that they can better understand the ramifications of the project on the environment and their use of the land, to gather information from community members relating to traditional uses and traditional knowledge in the project area and to assist in the preparation of reports that document potential impacts and concerns of community members.

Further, as I discussed with you at our March 2005 meeting, DTFN has been actively seeking appropriate technical resource people that could fulfil the "desk—top" review portion of the work set out in the workplan (proposal). While the parties were attempting to resolve outstanding issues with the workplan (proposal), the consultants identified by DTFN in December 2004 have since become unavailable to undertake the required work. As discussed with you, the search for an appropriate independent consultant has also been hampered by the fact that many of the qualified experts have been taken up and retained by proponents, other First Nations, public groups and government agencies involved in the Mackenzie Gas Project. However in April 2005, DTFN identified and secured the services of a resource advisor with extensive experience in the area of environmental assessment (EA), working with First Nations in EA reviews and directing EA reviews of major gas pipeline projects.

On reviewing this workplan and budget, you will see that several changes have been made to address TCPL's comments and concerns with costs. Further, I note that the proposal has been further streamlined to contribute to an effective and timely review and information gathering process. The proposal has now been tailored to address TCPL's desired goal of submitting an application to the Alberta Energy and Utilities Board (AEUB) in June 2005. Notwithstanding our position that your project is an integral part of the MGP and should be regulated by the National Energy Board, our attached proposal should meet your desired goal of submitting an application to the AEUB. The changes have been bolded and italicised to assist you in the review of the document. We look forward to hearing your comments on the workplan, working with you to confirm target dates for meetings and confirmation of funding so that this exercise can continue and conclude.

Again, DTFN resubres this proposal without prejudice to its views on the regulatory aspects of the project. DTFN has and continues to be of the view that the NEB should be the Regulator of this project – not the AEUB. Notwithstanding this issue, DTFN has and is still prepared to engage TCPL in the Community Review Process for the Dickens and Vardie projects. It does so as it is committed to working through these issues in accordance with the DTFN – TCPL Cooperation Protocol. Further it does so as a First Nation that wishes to be meaningfully consulted by the Crown.

DENE THA' FIRST NATION COMMUNITY REVIEW PROCCESS WORKPLAN AND BUDGET DICKENS AND VARDIE PROJECTS

1.0 BACKGROUND

Dene Tha' First Nation (DTFN) and Trans Canada Pipelines (TCPL) have signed a *Cooperation Protocol* that sets out both parties intention to build and maintain a strong working relationship. Under this agreement both parties agree to work collaboratively to identify and resolve issues arising from proposed *new* TCPL projects and *existing* operations. Discussions are now underway with respect to the proposed Alberta Dickens and Vardie projects – the southern portion of the Mackenzie Gas Project. DTFN wishes to be engaged in a review of the proposed projects and work with TCPL in a constructive manner. *DTFN desires* to achieve this through a Community Review Process that has been co – developed and that meets the interests and expectations of both parties. This document serves as a summary workplan that sets out the objectives, principles, deliverables, milestones and budget for the Community Review Process.

2.0 OBJECTIVE

DTFN wishes to establish and conclude a timely review process to enable the community to understand and evaluate the issues and impacts arising from the proposed Dickens and Vardie projects. The review process would provide the technical capacity and financial resources to engage TCPL on a level playing field. The process will assist the parties in identifying and resolving issues any concerns / issues on a bi – lateral basis, and to avoid resorting to Regulators where possible.

4.0 COMMUNITY REVIEW PROCCESS: COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION

The above objective and principles will be met through two steams of activities: Community Participation and Technical Review and Support. "Community Participation" is designed to maximize community awareness of and participation in the project review activities and is comprised of the following components;

- **4. 1 Community Advisory Panel:** This body will act as an important conduit for information flow between TCPL / DTFN and the community vis a vis the projects. A good cross section of community members / interests will be represented with emphasis on elders, youth, trappers and community members from the *Meander River, Chateh and Bushe communities*. The group will provide advice to DTFN Negotiation Team / DTFN on the overall review process and project issues. It is anticipated that this group will meet *three times during the course of the Community Review Process*.
- 4. 2 Community Meetings: In addition to the above activity, it is anticipated that general meetings (*Chateh, Meander River and Bushe*) will be held for interested community members. The meetings will be facilitated / hosted by the Community Advisory Panel and will provide an appropriate forum for TCPL to present its project, methodology / approach to studies and study findings / information gathering results. Meeting agendas and format will be jointly developed by the Community Advisory Panel and the TCPL project team.
- **4.3 Project Communications:** DTFN will promote and support the above activities through two communication activities. First, it will produce two project newsletters in lay person's language that will explain the project, project issues and the community review process. These newsletters will be distributed door to door in the **Chateh, Meander and Bushe communities.** TCPL will be consulted in the drafting of the newsletters. Secondly, community radio may be utilized to promote awareness of and participation in the community meetings.
- 4.4 Community Review Coordinators: Three community members will be hired from the Chateh (1), Meander River (1) and Bushe (1) communities to assist the DTFN Negotiation Team in undertaking the above activities. The coordinators will liase with community, coordinate community meetings, support communications efforts and provide translation and document review services. The coordinators will also attend key meetings along with DTFN Negotiations Team and undertake one on one home visits / meetings where required. The review coordinators will need to be fluent in Dene.
- 5.0 COMMUNITY REVIEW PROCCESS: TECHNICAL REVIEW AND SUPPORT

 The above objective and principles will be met through two steams of activities: Community

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Participation and Technical Review and Support. "Technical Review and Support" is designed to inform DTFN and the community about potential project impacts and support its decision making with respect to the proposed projects and is comprised of the following components;

5.1 Technical Resource Advisor. DTFN wishes to invite TCPL's in house – project staff and project consultants into the communities to participate in the **Community Review Process.** DTFN, however does wish to retain independent technical advice to assist the community to understand and interpret the data and information that TCPL has generated to support its project applications.

At this time it is proposed to DTFN would retain a Technical Rescore Control of Major relevant experience and credentials in the area of environmental assessment of major project reviews (including environmental assessments of major pipeline projects). This individual would take direction from and report to the DTFN Negotiation Team.

The Technical Resource Advisor would review TCPL's project development proposal and how the proposed project might impact the environment and the community. The individual would assess the adequacy of what TCPL has undertaken to date and identify gaps and means of addressing these gaps, and, consider and propose mitigation / best – practices as part their work. Specifically the Technical Resource Advisor would;

undertake a "desk - top" review of key project documents tabled by TCPL, including the "Environmental Design Basis, the "Traditional Land Use Report" and other relevant project related documentation;
participate in community meetings to understand and confirm the key concerns, values, rights and interests at stake for the community;
participate in information sharing sessions with TCPL in – house staff to discuss and attempt to resolve any outstanding technical / regulatory matters in a collegial manner;
assist in producing a final report for DTFN / TCPL and drafting of lay – person's summaries for community on the project and project issues

5.1.1 Additional Expert Advice

In developing this proposal, DTFN has elected to not assemble a large review team with a consultant identified for each valued eco – system component / review area (i.e. regulatory – environmental assessment, pipeline construction, design and monitoring, aquatic system health and fish, botany, heritage and socio – economic). Rather, it has chosen to *utilize the Technical Resource Advisor* as it wishes to demonstrate a level of trust in the work of TCPL's in house - project staff and project consultants. Such an approach also has the benefit of reducing potential duplication in work and costs to both parties. However, it may be possible that during the course of the review, that DTFN may disagree with the views / conclusions of TCPL and its team in a given area. (e.g. significance of effects on Caribou.

6.0 DELIVERABLES and MILESTONES

This proposal is designed to address TCPL's and DTFN's agreed to timelines for implementing and finalizing the Community Review Process;

Subject: Relationship with Dene Tha' First Nation

I wish to inform you of the excellent relationship which has developed between your company and our Nation. We are pleased with the cooperative approaches, which have been followed by our respective representatives. Our Nation intends to honour the spirit and intent of the Cooperation Protocol concluded between TCPL and our Nation.

We also wish to indicate our appreciation for your company's contribution to offering the Life Skills and Pre-employment Training Program at two of our communities. We look forward to your continued support for our educational priorities.

In light of the recently filed legal action against the Federal Government and other Parties associated with the Mackenzie Gas Pipeline Project, we wish to make it abundantly clear that our concerns are related to environmental protection and the Crown's obligation to respect our rights in the totality of our traditional territory in the NWT and northern Alberta. We are not opposed to the construction of the Pipeline. We only wish to be consulted and our rights respected by the Crown and the Proponents.

Notwithstanding our position on the appropriate regulatory regime for the Pipeline, in the NWT and Alberta, and the appropriate required mechanism for the ongoing protection of the environment and our traditional practices, we intend to continue our dialogue with TCPL through direct communications and community meetings, which have already been arranged for June 1, 2 and 3.

I wish to also inform you of the continued positive relationships, which have been established and maintained by your representatives, especially Robert Kendel, Bruce Wells, Perry Kocis and Karen Etherington and our Councillors, staff and consultants.
